- Melissa Joan Hart as Grace Wesley, a Christian teacher who struggles between giving up her faith or giving up her job
 - "For the longest time, while I played a witch on television [on 'Sabrina, The
 Teenage Witch'], the Christian community attacked me for popularizing the magic
 aspects on that secular TV show," Hart told the Chicago Sun Times. "Now it's the
 opposite. I'm getting grief for playing the good Christian woman who is being
 persecuted by the outside world!"
 - "Today, there are a lot of Christians being persecuted for their faith far beyond the freedoms this country was founded on," Hart told the Sun Times. "In the past, mainstream Christians were members of what we could call the big powerhouse religion at the time — and may have been doing a fair amount of persecuting minority religions. But now those Christians feel their faith is something that is trampled on or ignored. Now the tables have turned."

- "[I] felt a little bit of resistance to go and do this movie away from my family. I promised them I would be home," she said. "I had just finished six years of Melissa and Joey. This was my time to be home and be a mom. Now, I was feeling like I was picking up and leaving again."
- "I'm not someone to shy away from controversy. I actually enjoy taking it head on," she told CBN. "What we are trying to do here is to break down any boundaries and really show Christ's mission of bringing love and tolerance to the world."
- "First and foremost, we want to make a good movie. The character I was playing was very new to me," she said of Grace Wesley, the fictional teacher she portrays in the movie. "I had not really played a very introverted woman who stood by her faith, alone ... and she taught me a lot."

 - Great quote "You of all people should know that during a test the teacher remains silent."

Directing

- Harold Cronk is known for Jerusalem Countdown, Adventures of Mickey Matson and the Copperhead Treasure, God's Not Dead, Pirate's Code: The Adventures of Mickey Matson
- Born in Reed City, Michigan, Cronk went to school in the Baldwin School District until about sixth grade
- Attended school in Scottville, Michigan, where he was active in the Theatre department and graduated from Mason County Central High School in 1993
- Cronk graduated from Central Michigan University in 1998, with a Bachelor of Science in Art and K-12 Education

- Cronk taught high school Art courses and was voted Teacher of the Year, for two of his four years at Evart High School
- When the Reed City elementary school hired another art teacher in 1998, Cronk made a
 point of introducing himself to the new-hire, Matthew Tailford
 - During spring break in 2000, Tailford landed a job as the Art director on a television pilot
 - Dear Doughboy, Cronk and Tailford traveled to Los Angeles to perform
 Production Design and Art Direction duties for the show
 - The experience in Los Angeles motivated the pair to try their hand at producing Cronk's screenplays South Manitou and The Agent
- Cronk and Tailford also had greater ambitions to develop their own screenplays, Cronk found that he enjoyed directing and Tailford was interested in producing and acting
- With some industry experience behind them, they returned to Michigan to create a ten-minute short, War Prayer, based upon Mark Twain's short story, The War Prayer, a controversial war-story that was embargoed by Harper's Bazaar, until six years after Twain's death
- After receiving several rejection notices from various film festivals, the War Prayer was accepted by the Beverly Hills International Film Festival
 - Won the festival's Best Director Award for 2006
- Cronk is currently the CEO of 10 West Studios
- The win for Best Director, at the Beverly Hills Film Festival, resulted in a three picture deal with Origin Entertainment
- God's Not Dead was Cronk's first significant box office opening, with a gross of \$2.8 million on Friday (March 21, 2014), and \$8.5 million for the weekend, in a limited 780 theater release

Production

- Produced by Elizabeth Hatcher, David AR White, Russell Wolfe
- Combined between them, they are known for What If..., Mom's Night Out, Book of Esther, This is Our Time, Christmas Again, Redeemed
- Message of Pure Flix:
 - Pure Flix is a Christian movie studio that produces, distributes, and acquires

Promotion

- The day before the Iowa caucuses, presidential candidate Mike Huckabee (who appears in one scene) offered a free screening of the film
- Toyota's Group Vice President of Marketing, Jack Hollis initiated the Prius connection to the movie - "It was a passion project for him," said a media contact at Toyota
 - "shifting Toyota's image to a more heart-pounding brand"

Box Office

- In its opening weekend, the film grossed \$7.6 million (less than the original's opening of \$8.6 million), finishing fourth at the box office behind *Batman v Superman: Dawn of Justice* (\$51.3 million), *Zootopia* (\$19.3 million) and *My Big Fat Greek Wedding 2* (\$11.2 million)
- To date the film has made 8.8 million

Reception

- On Rotten Tomatoes, the film has a rating of 12%, based on 25 reviews, with an average rating of 3.7/10
- The site's consensus states: "Every bit the proselytizing lecture promised by its title, God's Not Dead 2 preaches ham-fistedly to its paranoid conservative choir."
- On Metacritic, the film has a score of 22 out of 100, based on 8 critics, indicating "generally unfavorable reviews"
- On CinemaScore, audiences gave the film an average grade of "A" on an A+ to F scale
- Bill Zwecker of the *Chicago Sun-Times* felt that the underlying issues presented in the film are relevant in today's world, but criticized its lack of subtlety, saying, "the entire film simply comes off as a two-hour, jazzed-up movie version of a sermon."
- Frank Scheck of The Hollywood Reporter criticized the film's "straw man" argument and
 its perceived victimizing of Christians: "Pounding its agenda with all the subtlety of a
 sledgehammer, God's Not Dead 2 will no doubt please its target audience. Everyone
 else will be left wondering why its fans seem to be suffering from such a persecution
 complex."
- Jordan Hoffman at *The Guardian*, while deeming it "a much better movie" than its predecessor, noted that "it is unfortunately just professional enough that there are only brief instances of transcendent badness, rather than drawn-out sequences."
