DEVELOPMENT

- Laika Entertainment- Coraline, ParaNorman, and The Boxtrolls
- Originally conceived by character designer Shannon Tindle, Knight took a personal interest in the film, and after working in animation for more than 20 years, he decided it was time to direct.
- More than 600 people worked on Kubo
- Laika spent \$63 million in Oregon making "Kubo," according to the Governor's Office of Film & Television. It received incentives totaling \$5.2 million over the course of the production.
- Magical shamisen, or three-stringed Japanese folk instrument similar an American banjo
- "This film expresses the respect and admiration all the artists at LAIKA feel for Japan and its culture." Knight says that he hopes to pay homage to the "beautiful, breathtaking, almost otherworldly" nature of Japan
- Influence of Hayao Miyazaki and Akira Kurosawa

- Known for Interstellar, Wolf of Wall Street, Dallas Buyers Club, Mud

ART PARKINSON (Kubo)

- Game of Thrones, San Andreas, Love, Rosie, Dracula Untold, The Anomaly, Dark Touch
- "Whenever I did the audition they sent the script over and it had a little illustration so I
 knew what Kubo looked like... they did send us over little care packages and things like
 that with like books of illustrations of the set and little props that they could send over
 and stuff."
- Thick Irish accent
- Sent Audio file for audition when Art was 11. Creators were listening to actor's voice that could cover the entire emotional range of the Kubo.
- Once Art was officially cast, Art's voiced dropped (puberty) and Knight was concerned and asked Art to do his voice pitch higher like when he first heard his audition.

RALPH FIENNES (Moon King)

- Raiden the Moon King, Kubo's grandfather, the father of the Sisters and Sariatu, and the main antagonist of the story
- Known for Harry Potter, Grand Budapest Hotel, Schindler's List, Skyfall

GEORGE TAKEI (Hosato)

- A villager who's a father figure to his daughter and teaches her their Japanese culture and traditions
- One of the most known Asian actors
- Known for Mulan, Star Trek, General Hospital

ROONEY MARA

- The Sisters, Kubo's evil aunts and two of the Moon King's daughters
- Known for Social Network, Her, Girl with the Dragon Tatto

CARY-HIROYUKI TAGAWA

- A villager and Kubo's biggest fan
- Known for *Planet of the Apes, Mortal Combat*

EASTER EGGS/ SYMBOLS/COMPARISONS/ TRIVIA

- "When we finally finished [Boat] shot, a year and a half later, the visual effects
 department built a piñata of Kubo's boat and they proceeded to beat the hell out of it,"
 Knight laughed. "They smashed it with savage glee. And instead of filling it with candy,
 they filled it with those little booze bottles you get on flights."
- Made the Guinness Book of World Records- largest animated puppet ever used on a set: Giant skeleton in the Hall of Bones of the film. 17 feet tall and its arms stretch out to 24 feet, and it was designed to be this huge so Kubo could be in the picture with it during filming
- Universal Studios Hollywood, kicked off with a carnival-style pre-party, complete with cookie decorating, cotton candy, snow cones, and mini donuts.

DIRECTING (Travis Knight)

- CEO and president of Laika Entertainment
- Directorial Debut
- *Kubo* is inspired by Knight's mythical childhood heroes and the "otherworldly" trip to Japan he took with his father as an 8-year-old kid

PRODUCTION/CINEMATOGRAPHY (Frank Passingham)

- Laika didn't have any sprawling soundstages to work with; they had a bunch of "gussy-upped table tops in a crummy warehouse outside of Portland."
- A mixture of computer animation and stop motion with a high-tech assist from 3-D printers that generate thousands of facial expressions for Laika's puppets.
- Complicated fight sequence at sea that took 18 months to animate.
- Boat comprised of 250,000 leaves, each applied by hand was one of the most difficult shots to put together.
- Tiny origami squares from durable Tyvek homewrap after regular paper disintegrated.

EDITING/VFX (Steve Emerson- VFX Supervisor)

- SKELETON: A giant, 16-foot, 400-pound, on a rotating base: "We were initially going to build a small, manageable skeleton," said camera and motion control engineer Steve Switaj. The team concluded they would need to build an entire oversized puppet.
 - The puppet was built on a hexapod robot
 - Its nine-foot arms needed support, and were effectively puppeteered by a motor-driven system. It all took six months to build.
 - Was built on a greenscreen stage, where it could interact with the other, much smaller puppets during the shoot.
 - The floor and lower part of the room was built as a practical set. The top was a CG extension

- THE GARDEN OF EYES: Metal mesh that covers the entire inside, in the center were lights emitting electricity.
 - Encoding system: mimics the movement of a bowling ball.
- ORIGAMI BOAT: Built of thousands of leaves using laser cutters.
- STORMY SEAS: Copper wires that would roll in wave-like motions covered with shower covers. Used rippled glass as a water stand-in
